The Honolulu Council marked a busy spring, hosting and taking part in a series of events, encompassing the full spectrum of the sea services and helping honor a local wounded warrior and the Pacific Fleet Sailor of the Year. Council Executive Director Jane Ferreira provided the following recap.

On March 6, the Honolulu Council supported the USS Tucson Family Day to share in the excitement for the return of the submarine on March 7. The Navy League also supported Single Sailor bags, supplying gummy bears, granola bars, saimin noodle soup and laundry pods to get the Sailors through the first 24 hours after a long deployment.

The council also supported the USS Mississippi Family Day on March 29 with ice cream and pizza. Families traveled to Pearl Harbor from across the country to celebrate the homecoming of the submarine on March 30. On the same day, USS John Paul Jones held its Family Spring Fling at the Ford Island Recreation Center, where the Navy League provided hot dogs, snacks, water and ice cream for the more than 200 families who were able to make the event.

On March 14, Lt. Gen. David H. Berger, commander, U.S. Marine Corps Forces Pacific (MARFORPAC) briefed members. MARFORPAC is the largest field command in the U.S. Marine Corps, conducting operational missions and delivering capabilities in support of U.S. Marine Corps forces. This was an insightful briefing and update on the Marine presence in the Pacific, and other critical factors facing us in the Pacific area of responsibility, Ferreira said.
